# Director of Teaching & Learning

### **Inquiry Drives Our Professional Learning**

Last month, I shared how the Danielson Framework for Teaching serves as a guiding tool for excellence in instruction at GIA. I also promised to explain how we are using this framework to enhance student learning. Our approach to professional learning is built on three key elements, all designed to support teacher growth and, ultimately, benefit our students. Focusing on Teacher Inquiry

The cornerstone of our model is teacher inquiry. Research from the Gallup Organization has shown that traditional employee development efforts—focused on identifying and fixing weaknesses—often fail to drive meaningful growth. Instead, Gallup's research highlights that developing strengths leads to higher performance, increased engagement, and greater well-being (Buono). Inspired by this, we have designed our professional learning system around teachers' strengths, curiosity, and internal motivation. Rather than focusing on "fixing" problems, our teachers actively seek ways to enhance student learning in their classrooms.

### The Role of Reflection in Learning

Research on metacognition tells us that reflection is essential to learning. That's why our Wednesday faculty learning sessions provide dedicated time for teachers and teaching assistants to share insights, reflect on their inquiry work, and collaborate with colleagues. For example, during last week's session, teachers came together to discuss their classroom growth efforts. Using structured discussion protocols, they asked thoughtful questions, analyzed the impact of their strategies, and planned next steps in small groups. This collaborative process mirrors the type of student-centered learning experiences we strive to create in our classrooms.

### **Using Data to Drive Improvement**

Our school gathers a wealth of data through MAP and iReady assessments, which help us understand students' individual needs and tailor instruction accordingly. However, in our faculty inquiry process, we go beyond standardized test data. Teachers are learning to collect and analyze classroom-level data—such as observational checklists and student reflections—to assess the immediate impact of their strategies and adjust their teaching in real time. This approach ensures that instructional decisions are informed, responsive, and effective.

Over the past few weeks, students have been diving into exciting games like Counseling Vocabulary Bingo and creative twists on classics like Red Light, Green Light, Simon Says, and Four Corners—but with a mindful message. These aren't just games—they're fun, interactive ways for students to explore big ideas like self-regulation, empathy, and kindness in action.

Each game highlights key counseling terms that help kids better understand themselves and others. And the best part? These are concepts that families can talk about and practice at home too!


